

HRH Group of Hotels is one of India's largest privately-owned chain of palace-hotels. What led to this success?


he proved everyone wrong: the seeds of heritage tourism were sown.

In October 2019, Udaipur was host to the Family Business Network 30th Global Summit, with over 500 business families from around the world attending the conference. What an achievement it was. Today in the domain of education our city is becoming a major hub. It is a tribute to several stakeholders who are striving to put Udaipur on par with Ahmedabad, Pune or Manipal. What is a cause for concern is the unplanned urban growth, the 'over tourism' which is straining the city's infrastructure and resources.

What were the major transformations you witnessed in the growing up years in Udaipur?

From the 1940s to 1970s everything changed. The princely state of Udaipur was merged into the State of Rajasthan; in 1971, the 26th Constitutional Amendment was passed and the rulers ceased to be recognised as rulers. My esteemed father, his late highness Maharana Bhagwat Singh Mewar, had the vision to foresee the challenges for the House of Mewar. In 1969, he established the Maharana of Mewar Charitable Foundation; in 1971, he collaborated with Taj Hotels for the management of Lake Palace Hotel. These were pioneering futuristic decisions which became two major platforms of future growth for the philanthropic and commercial initiatives of the House of Mewar. There was a considerable resistance from the family and the community to the decisions of my father. But

Our focus on tangible and intangible heritage is defined as the "living heritage" of Mewar, It is a holistic, integrated and sustainable development at the museum that is bringing together professionals, state-of-the-art technology, traditional craftsmen and ancient skills to preserve this heritage whether it is textiles and costumes, arms and armouries, sculptures, paintings, ancient photographs or the series of palaces which make Udaipur an iconic city of our continent. 2020 will witness the unveiling of new galleries and I am looking forward to the completion of these planned tasks which will make The City Palace Museum a world-class institution.

Since 2006-07, we have been unfolding the vision of Eternal Mewar. It can be summed up as a critical lesson on holistic heritage management and its perpetuation in our globalized world. I have always maintained that it is not the perpetuation of the family-name that is paramount: it is equally important to perpetuate the sustainable values and principles for 1400 years of the House of Mewar so that people can internalize them. In our iconic palace-hotels and retreats, through our museums and collections, we are continuing with the traditions of the regal past yet making them contemporary and relevant for a global audience. We are now three generations of the House of Mewar working together at HRH Group.

You ever think about other personal goals you would like to achieve...

My mission had always been that the city of Udaipur should be remembered as a 'centre of excellence' than what it is today. I hope through all our collective efforts we can go on adding 'holistic sustainable value' to this 'city of lakes' built by my forefathers more than 450 years ago.
